## **School Community Overview:**

Ransom Middle School began as a one room school for grades one through twelve in a wooded area in Cantonment, Florida. It was then called Gonzalez 106.

Mr. Earl Ransom donated the property on Muscogee Road when many of the students' families began working at and living near St. Regis Paper Company.

In 1969 it became a middle school for grades six through eight. The current facility (located on forty acres of the highest ground in northern Escambia County) was opened in 1988 and now has a student population of over 1,200 students in grades six through eight.

Ransom exemplifies the ideal middle school with teacher teams at each grade level (smaller schools within the school) and several exploratory/vocational choices for students. Ransom has an award-winning band and chorus with over six hundred-fifty students in the music program. Technology is also a major point of emphasis at RMS.

## School Programs and/or Initiatives:

A positive school culture and environment reflects: a supportive and fulfilling environment, learning conditions that meet the needs of all students, people who are sure of their roles and relationships in student learning, and a culture that values trust, respect and high expectations. Consulting with various stakeholder groups to employ school improvement strategies that impact the positive school culture and environment are critical. Stakeholder groups more proximal to the school include teachers, students, and families of students, volunteers, and school board members. Broad stakeholder groups include early childhood providers, community colleges and universities, social services, and business partners. Stakeholders play a key role in school performance and addressing equity. Consulting various stakeholder groups is critical in formulating a statement of vision, mission, values, goals, and employing school improvement strategies. Our school addresses building a positive school culture and environment as follows: Ransom Middle is a Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) school. All students review the schoolwide behavior expectations (TIGER Expectations) and the district rights and responsibilities handbook at the beginning of the school year. The TIGER Expectations that all students and staff follow are Taking Responsibility, Instilling Integrity, Going the Extra Mile,

Engaging in Learning, and Respecting Others. For academics, we have FAST PM1-PM2 progress monitoring awards, which are handed out to qualifying students. For students who need extra support in academic success, we use the Edgenuity online learning system for course recovery. This program allows students to complete any classes that they had previously not completed successfully. For attendance, we monitor by checking for perfect attendance, including tardies and parent checkouts, using our FOCUS information system. For behavior, we have outdoor field days for students with no major behavior referrals each semester. For students who need extra behavior support, the PBIS coach, the Rtl coordinator, and the behavior coach work closely with students in the Tier 2 and Tier 3 levels. These students have a behavior points tracker (Tiger Tracker) that is filled out by each teacher. These students then meet with their mentors (Rtl coordinator, behavior coach, or PBIS coach) weekly (Tier 2) or daily (Tier 3). At least monthly, all students with Tier 2 or 3 support meet with their mentors and receive prizes based on positive behavior. We also used the Suite360 online program to assign specific intervention modules to students based on their behavior needs. We monitored the intervention success by tracking on any subsequent major or minor referrals for those students.\*\* Communication is key to building positive relationships with parents, families and stakeholders. We will continue to implement activities that will build the capacity for meaningful parent/family involvement, and build relationships with the community to improve student academic achievement. We will continue to host parent/student orientations, open house at the beginning of each new school year, family engagement events such as Algebra and Geometry Night, Literacy and Math Night and National Junior Society meetings. Teachers and guidance counselors will conduct parent conferences with each student's family who desires a conference. Grade reports can be accessed on Focus by parents. We will send out weekly parent call-outs and post news/events on the school Facebook page and website. We will continue to seek out new partners in education each year. Additionally, we also work with community stakeholders, including our school navigator, CHS, and CDAC to support our students' social-emotional needs. Additional Services include: \*The district will provide a mental health liaison who will be focusing on small groups at each grade level. Areas of group focus include: concentrating on problem solving, conflict resolution and grieving. \*Guidance counselors will concentrate on reducing the number of absences through the "Child Attendance studies". A system is in place through Focus and Child Studies to notify parents immediately when their child has unexcused absences. \*Guidance is tracking homeless students monthly to see what progress is being made and to see if services are being provided. \*The RTi/MTSS coordinator will concentrate on students monthly who have 2 or more "Early Warning Indicators". ## School Library Programs and/or Initiatives:

Literacy growth is a cornerstone of our school. The following are some of Ransom library's programs and initiatives to promote literacy and community within our school:

Ransom Middle uses the Accelerated Reader computer program school-wide. This reading program helps manage and monitor students' reading skills and encourages growth. We provide motivation for student use via an AR store, from which students may select prizes. To increase interest, the library works in conjunction with our Literacy Leadership Team, administration and media coordinator to promote the initiative via the school's morning show. Additionally, we have larger prize drawings each semester.

The library promotes Battle of the Books in conjunction with the school academic team sponsor. All students are welcome to participate. Students read the SSYRA book list and take AR tests throughout the year.

Throughout the year, the library promotes reading via book trailers in conjunction with our media coordinator via school-wide morning television programs. Various seasonal and curriculum-based fictional and informational materials are displayed to promote curiosity and interest in literacy. To help students understand various types of fiction available and/or to help them find their preferred genre, genre-specific displays are made available all year.

The catalog also offers a variety of media formats, such as traditional print and magazines as well as a digital collection of eBooks, for students to be able to read on their chromebooks or other devices.

The collection also strives to meet the literacy needs of our diverse student body. We have a special designated section for struggling readers called, "Quick Reads", which houses titles at lower than our average reading level. We also have a separate section for those students who have permission to read young adult selections. We track parental reading limitations via FOCUS.

The librarian and media clerk participate in Ransom Middle School's Literacy Leadership team, and the librarian is a member of FAME (The Florida Association of Media in Education) and The Escambia County School Librarian Association, and she serves as facilitator for our school's LAC, Library Advisory Council. Our student library assistants are trained to respectfully interact with and assist their peers with various library skills and book selection throughout the school year.

The library hosts mentor/student meetings, including Pensacola State College's TRIO Educational Talent Search. (ETS) strives to increase the number of disadvantaged youth who complete high school and then enroll in and complete postsecondary education. The library houses our school-based Technology Coordinator, hosts various staff and community meetings, school events and activities, hosts a daily Critical Thinking class, a certified testing lab and other school-based tests.
